SECOND SESSION—THIRD LEGISLATURE

REGINA, THURSDAY, NOVEMBER 6, 1913.

3 O'CLOCK P.M.

This being the first day of the Second Session of the Third Legislative Assembly of the Province of Saskatchewan, for the despatch of business, pursuant to a Proclamation of His Honour George William Brown, Lieutenant Governor of the Province, dated the seventh day of October, 1913, and the House having met, His Honour entered the House and having taken his seat upon the Throne was pleased to open the Session with the following speech:

MR. SPEAKER AND GENTLEMEN OF THE LEGISLATIVE ASSEMBLY:

It is with sincere pleasure that I am able, in opening the Second Session of the Third Legislative Assembly, to express earnest thanks to Divine Providence on account of another excellent harvest. In a province to which the result of the labour of the husbandman is of first importance and to a Legislative Assembly which contains so large a number of men whose occupation is agriculture, the harvest season now drawing to a close cannot fail to be gratifying, resulting as it has done in a generous yield of grains of unusually high quality.

I am sure that the people of Saskatchewan join heartily in the pleasure which all Canadians must feel over the recent return to Canada of their Royal Highnesses the Duke and Duchess of Connaught and the Princess Patricia, and are especially thankful for the restoration to health of her Royal Highness the Duchess of Connaught after a critical illness which throughout Saskatchewan as elsewhere occasioned keen anxiety.

The business situation in our province is doubtless in some degree affected by the financial contraction which has been and is apparent in the world's money centres. While it would not be true to say that we rejoice at this condition, yet I may express the hope that lessons of prudence and economy are being taught thereby which will eventually make it beneficial rather than otherwise through a consequent strengthening of the foundations of our industrial and commercial fabric.

The eighth year of Saskatchewan's provincial existence was marked by the elevation to the rank of cities of two urban communities, viz., North Battleford and Weyburn. I was delighted to be privileged to take part in the inaugural ceremonies of both these cities. These were events serving to bring to notice the splendid growth which has taken place within our borders since Saskatchewan became a province.

The year has witnessed a marked increase in the attention paid by the farmers of the province to live stock production. It is gratifying that such should be the case in view of the world-wide scarcity of certain classes of stock and the satisfactory prices that are now being paid for nearly all the products of animal husbandry. Recognising the increasingly large part that stock raising and dairying must and should play in our agricultural development my Government proposes to continue fostering these important branches of agriculture in every practicable manner.

At the Dry Farming Congress which ended one week ago at Tulsa, Oklahoma, our farmers by their successful exhibits further demonstrated that Saskatchewan soil has no equal for the production of grains.

A delegation of my Ministers attended an Interprovincial Conference held at Ottawa on the twenty-seventh, twenty-eighth and twenty-ninth ultimo. Important matters affecting the province were dealt with, of which a report will be duly submitted to you.

Inasmuch as the Federal Prime Minister had failed to implement his promise to call a conference in connection with the transfer of Saskatchewan's public resources the occasion of the aforementioned visit to Ottawa was further made use of to bring the subject again to his attention, and a meeting was obtained at which were present the Prime Minister of Canada, the Minister of the Interior and members of the Governments of Saskatchewan, Alberta and Manitoba. It is to be earnestly hoped that the settlement of the important question of the transfer to the province of our natural resources may be expedited. Provincial activities in various directions are retarded and will continue to be discouraged as long as the subject remains in its present position, amongst these being the prosecution of a policy for the development of Northern Saskatchewan.

Amongst the events of the year in Saskatchewan not the least notable was the assembling at Regina of the annual conference of the Canadian Public Health Association. Largely attended by a widely representative delegation which counted amongst its members many leaders of public thought along hygienic lines, and dealing with problems of first importance to Canada, the conference was momentous and valuable. The selection of our capital as its meeting place was a distinct tribute to the advanced position which Saskatchewan has taken in policy relating to public health administration.

Greater facilities for the administration of justice have been provided by the inauguration of the nine new Judicial Districts which were created about one year ago. Three of the additional Judges required to carry on the work of these districts have already been appointed by the Dominion Government and it is expected that the remaining six will be appointed shortly.

The formal dedication of the initial buildings of our Provincial University and Agricultural College took place at the time of the Annual Convocation on the first of May. Amongst others who assisted towards making

the proceedings impressive and memorable were President Falconer, of Toronto University and President McLean, of Manitoba University.

Commendable progress is being made in the construction of a number of important and urgently needed public buildings, notably the Hospital for the Insane at Battleford, the Normal School at Regina, and the New Regina Jail.

The growing importance which the principle of co-operation is assuming in the economic life of our province has been demonstrated during the past year by the rapid expansion and increasing financial prosperity of the Saskatchewan Co-operative Elevator Company, by the success which has attended the first year's operation of The Hail Insurance Act, and finally by the recommendations contained in the report of the Agricultural Credits Commission. This Commission, as you are aware, was appointed in pursuance of a Resolution passed at your last session. After having made an exhaustive study both at home and abroad of the subjects confided to them, the members of the Commission submitted their report to my Government a short time ago. This report is now being printed and a large number of copies will soon be ready for distribution. Meanwhile you have, no doubt, observed from the summary of the conclusions of the report which was published lately in the newspapers of the province, that in the opinion of the Commission the solution of Saskatchewan's agricultural credits problem will be found in a further application of the principle of co-operation. The report will be laid before you in due course and a measure dealing with the matters involved will be submitted for your consideration.

The important question of municipal capital expenditures has also engaged the attention of my Government since your last session. The expediency of creating a body vested with powers of a character similar to those exercised by the Local Government Board in England in connection with the launching of municipal enterprises has received their very serious consideration. One of my ministers made it the object of special study in London. As a result of the Government's activities in this direction a measure will be submitted to you dealing with this most important matter.

Other measures will be submitted to you, amongst them being Bills amending the Acts relating to Education, Drainage, Hail Insurance, Municipal Law and the Civil Service.

The Public Accounts of the province for the last fiscal year will be laid before you. The Estimates of Revenues and Expenditures for 1914-15, prepared with due regard to economy and the efficiency of the public service will also be placed before you.

I commend the business of the session to your earnest consideration and pray that in your labours you may have the guidance and blessing of Almighty God.

His Honour was then pleased to retire.

Mr. Speaker informed the House that in order to prevent mistakes he had obtained a copy of the Speech of His Honour the Lieutenant Governor which was laid on the Table.

- (c) If the salaries of such Liquor License Inspectors or Detectives were paid during the time, if any, they were present in such constituency at said By-Election?

Mr. Turgeon answered as follows:

The Government has no knowledge of any of the employees in connection with the Liquor License Administration in this Province being present in the Hanley Constituency during the recent By-Election there.

- (b) For extension of or introduction of a system of Experimental Farm Stations?

Mr. Motherwell answered as follows:

1. Until the Report of the Education Commission is received no decision can be reached by the Government.

2. The Government has had under consideration the question of making provision for Demonstration Farm Plots in connection with the Extension Work of the Agricultural College, but as yet no final decision has been reached as to the policy to be pursued.

Mr. Willoughby asked the Government the following question:

Has any provision been made for an Exhibit by the Province at the Land Show to be held in Chicago, Ill., this month?

Mr. Motherwell answered as follows:

No provision has been made for an Exhibit by the Province at the United States Land Show to be held at Chicago this month.

Mr. Willoughby asked the Government the following question:
Was the visit of the Attorney General to Europe last summer official; and, if official, what was the purpose?

Mr. Calder answered as follows:

Yes. The Attorney General was delegated:

- (a) To inquire into the question of Municipal Financing in London;
- (b) To investigate the operation of British Statutes applying to Municipal Control, Supervision and Financing;
- (c) To arrange for certain Temporary Loans for the Province on Capital Account and to confer with our London Agent on other financial matters.

Mr. Willoughby asked the Government the following questions:

- (a) What Municipalities have come under the operation of The Hail Insurance Act?
- (b) What are the aggregate Claim Losses for Injury by Hail in 1913 in such Municipalities?
- (c) What amount has been received from the Tax for paying of such Claims?
- (d) The names of Inspectors or Appraisers who appraised losses and the Salaries or Compensation paid each?

Mr. Motherwell answered as follows:

48. How many cases of typhoid and how many cases of tuberculosis were treated by all hospitals in the province during last year?

49. What is the bed capacity of each hospital in the Province? What is the total number of patients treated in these hospitals during the past year?

50. What is the total number of births and deaths reported from each of these hospitals? What number of patients were reported as cured, improved and unimproved for each hospital?

51. How many cases of typhoid fever were reported by physicians for 1911-12? How many cases were treated in all hospitals during the same period?

52. What is the average cost per patient per day in hospitals throughout the Province during 1913?

53. What is the total revenue and total expenditure for hospitals during the past year?

54. How many hospitals in this Province are not receiving Government grant? Where are they located? Why are they not receiving grant? Are these hospitals inspected by the Commissioner of Public Health?

55. Why has not the Bureau of Public Health control of Vital Statistics? How many Registrars are there in this Province? What is the name and address of each Registrar and what are the boundaries of the district he serves? Should any further appointments be made? How many deaths from infectious diseases were reported during 1912?

56. What is the total number of dairies in the Province? How many Provincial Government dairies in the Province? How many dairies have been inspected? How many Provincial Government dairies have been inspected by the Inspectors of the Bureau of Public Health? Do the cattle supplying milk to the Provincial Government dairies receive the tuberculin test?

57. What is the total number of butcher shops in the Province? How many have been inspected? What is the total amount received for license fees from butcher shops? Should not the fees be collected by Municipalities instead of the Provincial Government?

58. Does the Bureau of Public Health provide inspectors for railway coaches and stations? What regulations have been prepared for the safety and health of the public during railway transportation? Does the Bureau make any effort by legislation and inspection to prevent railroad companies locating townsites in sloughs or other low and unhealthy places?

59. How many persons in this Province suffering with an incurable disease were sent to homes for incurables during the past year? What was the expense? Who paid it?

60. How many persons were deported during 1913? What was the cause of deportation? Who recommends deportation to the Immigration Department?

61. Has a complete sanitary survey been made of the shores of lakes and streams in the Province? What streams have been surveyed? Has a water analysis been made of each lake and stream by the Bureau of Public Health, especially those waters that are being used for domestic purposes?

62. What is the report on the survey of the Wascana Creek? What has actually been done to prevent pollution of creek? Has there been an examination of the effluent from the Regina disposal works? Have farmers along the shores of this creek been compelled to remove their stable and yards from the shores of this creek in order to prevent pollution of the stream?

63. Why is there so much legal work in connection with the Bureau of Public Health done under an Order in Council? Would it not be better to have all Public Health legislation in one volume? Would it not be preferable to prepare a new Public Health Act on account of the number of amendments?

Mr. Langley answered as follows:

I do not consider the questions as put by the Hon. Member either intelligible or reasonable and therefore I do not intend to answer them.

Has the Government or any Member of the Government been requested to introduce legislation at this Session of Parliament granting the Franchise to Women?

Mr. Scott (Swift Current) answered as follows:

A petition addressed to the First Minister has been received which prays that at this session of the House an Act may be passed for a general extension of the franchise to the women of Saskatchewan on equal terms with men.

Mr. Wylie asked the Government the following question:

- (a) When does the Government intend to extend the long distance Telephone from Gull Lake through Maple Creek to the Alberta Boundary to connect up with the Alberta Telephone System?
- (b) Why was the extension delayed this year?

Mr. Bell answered as follows:

- (a) The Government has under consideration the construction of long distance telephone line westward from Gull Lake during the season 1914.
- (b) With a view to reducing capital outlay during a period of general financial stringency it was considered advisable to cut down our contemplated programme of line construction for the year.

Mr. Bradshaw asked the Government the following question:

- (a) Has the Government established a department known as the Provincial Information Bureau?
- (b) If so, the date when such Department was created?
- (c) The number and the names of the officials employed therein?
- (d) The amount of remuneration, either by way of salary or expenses, paid to each official?
- (e) The territory assigned to each official?

A limited number of school districts are so affected according to special reports made to the Department of Education in response to instructions sent out by the Department on twentieth of August, 1913, the Department having been informed of certain districts that were in default in respect of debenture coupons. The difficulty has arisen in some cases through failure of banks to provide the hitherto usual accommodation to school districts and municipalities. After making a practice of advancing moneys as required by these bodies during years past, the banks suddenly withdrew almost all such credits and at a time when the need of such accommodation was unusually urgent. In certain other cases the difficulty has arisen through the failure of municipalities and school districts to adjust themselves to each other and to the new method of assessment and collection brought into operation with the creation of rural municipalities;

2. At last Session of this House an amendment was made to The Rural Municipalities Act with the object specified. It would probably have proved effective except for the financial depression occurring in 1913 which made tax collection more difficult and the action of the banks above referred to. Further amendment will be proposed;

3. The proposed legislation will enact provision for compulsory, periodical and prompt payment of moneys to school districts by the municipal authorities who collect the school district taxes.

Mr. Mitchell asked the Government the following questions:

1. Has the Department of Public Health rules and regulations governing the installation of sewage disposal plants; if so, are our Cities and Towns complying with these regulations?

2. Have microscopical, bacteriological examinations been made of the effluvia at the different disposal plants to see if the plants are doing effective work?

3. How many systems of sewage disposal plants have we in this Province?

4. Has the Health Department any model plant that they recommend to instal?

Mr. Langley answered as follows:

1. Yes. Regulations have been in existence for some years governing the installation of sewage disposal works; revised regulations are in course of preparation based upon certain proposed amendments to The Public Health Act. These revised regulations will be issued when the amendments referred to have been submitted to and passed by this House. The Cities and Towns are complying with the regulations. In addition to regulations, a list of suggestions to guide Municipalities in undertaking new sewage disposal works has been drafted and sent to engineers acting for such Municipalities. As a result of these suggestions, the installations for which plans are being submitted are designed in accordance with the most recent and advanced knowledge in the matter of sewage treatment;

2. Every sample of sewage effluent submitted to the Provincial Analyst is subjected to both chemical analysis and microscopical, bacteriological examination. The results of the analysis and bacteriological examination are expressed in such terms as to indicate the comparative efficiency of each process of treatment in the works. Alterations or extensions have been recommended in the case of some installation, and bacteriological examinations have been delayed until such time as these installations have been completed in accordance with the directions of the Commissioner of Public Health. A study of the results obtained from bacteriological or chemical examination of the effluent from installations recently completed is of little value in estimating the amount of purification which can be obtained from the same plant when the filter beds have had sufficient time to mature. Samples of the effluent from the Regina or Moose Jaw Sewage Disposal Works have, however, already been taken for the purpose of demonstrating the increasing efficiency of a plant due to the above circumstances;

3. Apart from the numerous small installations in connection with institutions and public buildings, there are eight municipal sewage disposal plants in operation in the Province. Plans for ten new municipal installations have been submitted to the Commissioner of Public Health;

4. The Bureau of Public Health has no model plant which is recommended for all cases. The problem of sewage disposal is only in the preliminary stages of solution, and it is the policy of the Bureau of Public Health to inquire into every new feature in design which is calculated to give a higher standard of treatment and to advise municipalities of such improvements. Engineers acting for the Towns and Cities in the Province receive every encouragement in embodying the most advanced principles of sewage treatment in proposed new works.

Before submitting plans for new works, engineers are advised by the Bureau as to the requirements which must be complied with, but these refer more to data on which calculations must be based, and principles of treatment than to the inclusion of any particular type of apparatus or to any limitations in design.

Each particular installation must be considered according to the local conditions prevailing. A plant which would give complete satisfaction where the effluent is discharged into a river of the volume of the North Saskatchewan at Prince Albert might prove highly offensive if located on the Wascana Creek.

The Bureau of Public Health does not, and never will, advocate the adoption of any plant for all circumstances. Certain Standard or "Model"

principles are, however, laid down by the Bureau and with these principles Municipalities must comply.

That the amount of the additional securities to be so guaranteed shall not exceed the sum represented by \$2,000 per mile of the mileages of the respective lines of railway so guaranteed as to securities pursuant to Chapter 3 of the Statutes of Saskatchewan of 1908-9, Chapter 4 of the Statutes of 1909 and Chapter 8 of the Statutes of 1912 (hereinafter called "the Principal Acts").

That the additional securities shall form part of the issue secured by mortgage dated the eighteenth day of May, 1909, and two certain supplementary instruments thereto dated the fifteenth day of March, 1910, and the twenty-first day of June, 1912, all made between the Canadian Northern Railway Company, National Trust Company, Limited, and the British Empire Trust Company, Limited, and his Majesty, representing the Province of Saskatchewan (being the deeds of trust by way of mortgage securing the guaranteed securities authorised to be issued and guaranteed by the Principal Acts).

That before the additional securities are issued and guaranteed supplementary mortgages or deeds of trust covering the lines, in form approved by the Lieutenant Governor in Council shall, as provided in the Principal Acts be taken to the Trustees of the Mortgage dated the eighteenth day of May, 1909, herein above referred to.

That certificates of the Minister of Railways as to the mileages of the said lines of railway shall for the purposes of the said Guarantee and of the additional securities be conclusive, but the Minister may issue interim certificates from time to time based on the estimated mileage of the said lines or any of them or may fix temporarily the mileage with respect to which such additional securities may be issued; that final certificates shall be ultimately issued by the Minister with regard to each of the said lines to accord with the miles and fractions of miles of the said lines actually constructed between the points authorised.

That should the constructed mileage of any of the lines of railway for which additional securities are provided or the aggregate mileage of some or all of such lines be less than the mileage estimated with regard thereto by reason whereof there remains:

- (a) A surplus of authorised mileage in respect of which no securities at the rate specified with regard thereto were actually issued or guaranteed; or
 - (b) A surplus of proceeds of the moneys realised by sale, pledge or otherwise of the guaranteed securities issued in respect thereof;
- the Lieutenant Governor may (in addition to the securities authorised under Section 2 of the said Act of the present Legislature) guarantee additional securities in respect of such surplus of mileage at the original rate of \$13,000 per mile, or may authorise the application of such surplus of proceeds, whichever may be the case, in or in respect of the further

construction by the company of extensions of the lines mentioned in the said schedules, or any of them, or of branches therefrom, or of other lines of railway in Saskatchewan approved by the Lieutenant Governor in Council, such extensions, branches, or other lines so approved being called substituted lines.

That a supplementary deed or deeds of trust covering the mileage of such substituted lines shall be taken to the Trustees of the Original Instrument provided for by Chapter 3 of the Statutes of Saskatchewan for the years 1908-9 and that the provisions of Section 10 of the said Chapter 3 of the Statutes of Saskatchewan for 1908-09, where not inconsistent herewith, shall apply to the supplementary deeds issued under the said Act of the present Session and to the securities which may be issued and guaranteed in pursuance thereof.

On motion of Mr. Calder, seconded by Mr. Scott,

That the said securities shall be secured by one or more deeds of trust by way of mortgage or charge to a trustee or trustees approved by the Lieutenant Governor in Council and such deed or deeds of trust shall grant a first mortgage or charge upon the line or lines of railway included therein and with respect to the mileage of which the securities secured thereby are issued, and the rolling stock and equipment present and future acquired for the purposes of the said line or lines so included in such deed or deeds of trust respectively, and the tolls, revenues and income arising and to arise therefrom, and the rights, privileges, franchises and powers of the company now or hereafter held or enjoyed in respect of the said line or lines and the operation and maintenance thereof.

That the kind of securities to be guaranteed and the form and terms thereof and the form and terms of the deed or deeds of trust by way of mortgage securing them and the times and manner of the issue of the securities and the disposition of the moneys to be raised thereon by sale, pledge or otherwise, pending the expenditure of such moneys for the purpose of the said lines of railway respectively and the form and manner of the guarantee or guarantees from time to time or at any time given in respect thereof shall be such as the Lieutenant Governor in Council may approve.

That the said guarantee or guarantees shall be signed by the Provincial Treasurer or such other officer as may be designated by the Lieutenant Governor in Council and upon being so signed the Province of Saskatchewan shall become liable for the payment of the principal and interest of the securities guaranteed according to the tenor thereof; and that the Lieutenant Governor in Council be authorised to make arrangements for supplying the money necessary to fulfil the requirements of the said guarantee or guarantees and to advance the amount necessary for that purpose out of the general revenues of the province; and that in the hands of any purchaser, pledgee or other person acquiring any of such securities the said guarantee or guarantees so signed shall be conclusive evidence that the requirements of the said Act with respect to the guaranteed securities and the deed of trust and all matters relating thereto have been complied with.

- (a) A surplus of authorised mileage in respect of which no securities at the rate specified with regard thereto were actually issued or guaranteed; or

(b) A surplus of proceeds of the moneys realised by sale, pledge or otherwise of guaranteed securities issued in respect thereof; the Lieutenant Governor in Council may guarantee additional securities in respect of such surplus of mileage or authorise the application of such surplus of proceeds, whichever may be the case, in or in respect of the further construction by the company of extensions of the lines mentioned in the said schedule or of branches therefrom, or of lines of railway in Saskatchewan approved by the Lieutenant Governor in Council.

That a supplementary deed or deeds of trust covering the mileage further constructed by the company as provided for in the next preceding clause shall be taken to the trustees of the original instruments before mentioned and that the provisions hereinbefore set forth with respect to supplementary instruments shall where not inconsistent with this and the next preceding clause apply to the supplementary deeds executed under this clause and to the securities which may be issued and guaranteed in pursuance hereof.

That it is expedient to provide that the Lieutenant Governor in Council be authorised on such terms and conditions not inconsistent with the provisions of Chapter 13 of the Statutes of Saskatchewan passed in the year 1912-13, intituled "An Act respecting Certain Aid towards the Construction of Terminals of the Grand Trunk Pacific Branch Lines

Company and the Grand Trunk Pacific Saskatchewan Railway Company (hereinafter called the said Act) as amended by an Act of the present Session of the Legislature, to guarantee the payment of the principal and interest of certain additional securities in aid of the construction of the railway bridges and approaches thereto mentioned in the schedule hereto.

It shall be lawful for the Lieutenant Governor in Council to authorise the Provincial Treasurer to raise by way of loan upon the credit of the Province such sum or sums of money not to exceed in the whole one million dollars for all or any of the following purposes as may be approved by the Legislature, namely:

- (a) For the purpose of carrying out the provisions of *An Act respecting the Purchase and Sale of Live Stock*;
- (b) For the purpose of aiding the dairy industry of the Province under the provisions of *The Dairymen's Act*;
- (c) For the purpose of aiding in the securing of farm and domestic labour;
- (d) For the purpose of reimbursing the general revenue fund of the Province for moneys expended under legislative appropriations similar to those enumerated.

2. The aforesaid sum of money or any portion thereof may be borrowed from time to time, as approved by the Legislature in the annual estimates, for any term or terms not exceeding ten years at such rate as shall be determined by the Lieutenant Governor in Council, and shall be raised upon the credit of the general revenue fund of Saskatchewan and shall be chargeable thereupon.

3. Every loan made pursuant hereto shall be secured by such bonds, debentures, inscribed stock or other securities and in such form as may be approved by the Lieutenant Governor in Council and every such security shall be free from all provincial taxes, succession duty charges and impositions whatsoever.

4. The sums of money hereby authorised to be raised by way of loan shall be raised as provided by *The Saskatchewan Loans Act* and the sums raised under the authority of this Act shall form part of the general revenue fund of Saskatchewan.

5. It shall be the duty of the Provincial Treasurer to keep a proper and complete record of all moneys borrowed under the provisions hereof, which record shall also include a detailed statement as to the purpose for which such moneys were expended and all collections made from time to time on account thereof, as well as all moneys remaining unpaid.

6. The Provincial Treasurer shall make and submit to the Lieutenant Governor in Council an annual report to be laid before the Legislative Assembly with the public accounts, which report shall include a statement respecting every loan, as aforesaid, and the uses for which such loan is expended.

That it is expedient to provide that the Lieutenant Governor in Council be authorised on such terms and conditions not inconsistent with the provisions of Chapter 14 of the Statutes of Saskatchewan passed in the year 1912, intituled "An Act to authorise the Guarantee of Certain Securities of the Grand Trunk Pacific Saskatchewan Railway Company" (hereinafter called "the company") as amended by An Act of the present Session of the Legislature to amend the said Act, as may be agreed upon with the company to guarantee the payment of the principal and interest of the bonds, debentures, debenture stock or other securities (hereinafter called "securities") of the company to the extent and upon the terms hereinafter set forth.

2. That the amount of securities to be guaranteed under the said Act and amending Act, also an Act of the present Session of the Legislature intituled "An Act to authorise the Guarantee of Certain Securities of the Grand Trunk Pacific Saskatchewan Railway Company," shall not exceed the sum represented by \$15,000 per mile of the respective lines of railway mentioned in the schedules to the Acts aforementioned, and that the interest payable upon such securities shall be at the rate of four and one-half per centum per annum, half-yearly, and that the principal shall be payable in thirty years from the passing of the aforementioned Acts of the present Session of the Legislature.

That it is expedient to provide that the Lieutenant Governor in Council be authorised on such terms and conditions not inconsistent with the provisions of the Acts of the present Session of the Legislature to authorise the Guarantee of Certain Securities of the Grand Trunk Pacific Saskatchewan Railway Company (hereinafter called "the company") as may be agreed upon with the company to guarantee the payment of the principal and interest of the additional bonds, debentures, debenture stock or other securities (hereinafter called "securities") of the company to the extent and upon the terms hereinafter set forth.

2. That the additional securities shall form part of the issue secured or to be secured by the mortgage or the deeds of trust by way of mortgage made or to be made securing the guaranteed securities authorised to be issued and guaranteed by chapter 14 of the Statutes of Saskatchewan passed in the year 1912, intituled "An Act to authorise the Guarantee of Certain Securities of the Grand Trunk Pacific Saskatchewan Railway Company," (hereinafter called the "said Act") and amending Act of the present Session of the Legislative Assembly, and that the additional securities shall be limited to the amount represented by \$15,000 per mile of the additional lines of railway mentioned in the schedule hereto, and that the interest thereon shall be payable at the rate of four and one-half ($4\frac{1}{2}$) per centum per annum half-yearly.

That it is expedient to provide that the Lieutenant Governor in Council be authorised on such terms and conditions not inconsistent with the provisions of the Act of the present session of the Legislature respecting Certain Aid toward the construction of Certain Bridges and Terminals of the Canadian Northern Saskatchewan Railway Company (hereinafter called "the company") as may be agreed upon with the company, to guarantee the payment of the principal and interest of the bonds, debentures, debenture stock or other securities (hereinafter called "securities") of the company to the extent, for the purpose, and upon the terms hereinafter set forth.

2. That the total amount of the securities to be so guaranteed hereunder shall not exceed the sum of \$1,000,000. That the said securities may be payable in whole or in part in lawful money of Canada, or its equivalent in sterling or other money. (a) The terminals of the company at the City of Moose Jaw, in the Province of Saskatchewan, and upon all terminal buildings, structures and improvements thereon, and the tracks, sidings, plant, machinery and equipment used or acquired in connection with the operation of the terminals, the whole being hereinafter referred to as the terminals;

(b) The railway bridges of the company at the crossings of the Moose Jaw creek and the Canadian Pacific Railway, extending from the neighbourhood of Lilloet street to the neighbourhood of Fairford street in the City of Moose Jaw, and over the Moose Jaw creek in the neighbourhood of the highway bridge over such creek on Main street south in the said City, and all structures and works incidental thereto or forming part thereof, the same being hereinafter referred to as "the bridges";

and the tolls, revenues and income arising and to arise from the terminals and bridges, and the rights, privileges, franchises and powers of the company now or hereafter held or enjoyed in respect of the terminals and the bridges and the operation and maintenance thereof.

4. That from time to time as the terminals are constructed or provided by means of the proceeds of the securities, the company shall deposit with the Minister of Railways (hereinafter called the "Minister") plans approved by him, showing with sufficient accuracy to locate the same the lands, structures and properties constituting the terminals, and will supplement such plans with lists or statements, where necessary, to more clearly designate the properties to be charged by the said deed or deeds of trust by way of mortgage or charge.

5. That the kind of securities to be guaranteed, and the form and terms thereof, and the form and terms of the deed or deeds of trust by way of mortgage securing the same, and the times and manner of the issue of the securities, and the disposition of the moneys, to be raised thereon by sale, pledge or otherwise, pending the expenditure of such

moneys for the purposes of the terminals and bridges, and the form and manner of the guarantee or guarantees from time to time or at any time given in respect thereof shall be such as the Lieutenant Governor in Council may approve.

6. That the said guarantee or guarantees shall be signed by the Provincial Treasurer or such other officer as may be designated by the Lieutenant Governor in Council and upon being so signed the Province of Saskatchewan shall become liable for the payment of the principal and interest of the securities guaranteed according to the tenor thereof and the Lieutenant Governor in Council be authorised to make arrangements for supplying the money necessary to fulfil the requirements of the said guarantee or guarantees and to advance the amount necessary for that purpose out of the general revenues of the Province, and that in the hands of any purchaser, pledgee or other person acquiring any of such securities the said guarantee or guarantees so signed shall be conclusive evidence that the requirements of this Act with respect to the guaranteed securities and the deeds of trust and all matters relating thereto have been complied with.

7. That subject to the proviso in this clause contained, the deed or deeds of trust (hereinafter called "the original instruments") securing the securities guaranteed may provide for the issue from time to time, and ranking *pari passu* with the said securities, and without preference or priority one over the other of additional securities of similar kind, tenor and effect in respect of the terminals and bridges, and also additional securities of similar kind, tenor and effect also ranking *pari passu* and without preference or priority as aforesaid in respect of additional terminals, bridges or works (other than those hereinbefore described) in the Province of Saskatchewan to be hereafter constructed by the company but in amount not exceeding the actual expenditure made by the company for and in respect of such additional terminals, bridges and works:

Provided always that before any such additional securities are issued the guarantee by the Province of the payment of the principal and interest thereof shall first have been authorised and the amounts to be issued in respect of such terminals, bridges or works shall first have been fixed by the Legislative Assembly and that such guarantee shall first have been given pursuant thereto.

8. That a supplementary deed or deeds of trust (herein called "supplementary instruments") covering the terminals, bridges or works in respect of which additional securities are authorised to be issued, or such additional terminals, bridges or works, as aforementioned, as the case may be, in the form approved by the Lieutenant Governor in Council shall from time to time be taken to the trustees of the original instruments; and that such additional securities shall be issued under the terms of the original instruments and supplementary instruments which together with the mortgaged premises covered by the original and supplementary instruments shall form the security for all securities issued thereunder in the same manner and with the same effect as if the original instrument and supplementary instrument or instruments formed together but one instrument and as if all the securities issued or to be issued under the original or supplementary instruments were issued under one instrument.

From Standing Committee on Public Accounts and Printing:

Your Committee have had under consideration the matters referred to them by the Assembly on Wednesday, November 26, 1913, pertaining to the purchase by the Government for a Jail Site of the south half and north-west quarter of Section 2 and the south-west quarter of Section 11, all in Township 18, Range 19, West of the Second Meridian.

The following witnesses were examined by your Committee: Mr. E. Brown, Mr. H. S. Carpenter, Mr. J. W. Evoy, Hon. A. P. McNab, Hon. G. A. Bell, Mr. F. J. Robinson, Mr. P. R. McDonald, Mr. R. Smith.

The Deputy Minister of Public Works also produced the official file containing all documents and correspondence in connection with the said purchase.

Your Committee have examined all the evidence adduced to them and as a result of their inquiry, wish to report as follows:

That the aforesaid land purchased by the Government is of excellent quality and advantageously located and suitable in every respect for the purposes intended.

That the price paid for the land was fair and reasonable.

That the procedure followed by the Government in securing the said land was a wise and reasonable one, and the one best calculated to ensure the securing of the most suitable land at a low price.

That absolutely no evidence was adduced of any fraud or other improper conduct in connection with the said purchase by the Government or any member or official thereof or any other person.

That no person derived any pecuniary advantage from the said purchase by the Government except the owner of the land, who received the purchase price from the Government.

That it is expedient for the purpose of supplementing the Revenues of the Crown in the Province that every Company, Joint Stock Company, Corporation, Association, individual, partnership, syndicate or trust which transacts business in the Province under his, its or their name or otherwise, or through an agent or agents, shall, subject to any limitation in any law dealing with the matter, annually pay to the Crown in this Province each and every year the several taxes at the times and in the manner hereinafter set forth:

1. Every Bank shall pay a tax of \$300 for every branch office of the Bank in any incorporated City;
2. The sum of \$100 for every branch office of the Bank in every incorporated town;
3. The sum of \$25 for every other branch office of the Bank.

Every Private Bank shall pay a tax of \$200 when its head office is situated in a City or Town and \$100 when its head office is situated in a Village, and every Private Bank shall pay an additional tax of \$25 for each of its branches or agencies in the Province.

Every insurance company which transacts business in the Province shall pay a tax of one per cent. calculated on the gross premiums received by such company in respect of the business transacted in Saskatchewan during the preceding year but in the case of Mutual Fire and Hail Insurance Companies which receive premiums in cash the tax shall be calculated on the gross premiums received by such companies in cash in respect to the insurance transacted on the cash plan in the Province during the preceding year.

In the case of any insurance company which lends or invests money on security in the Province and has invested in Saskatchewan more than \$50,000, such company shall, in addition to the one per cent. of gross premiums, pay a tax of 40c. on every thousand dollars invested by a company in the Province.

Every land company which transacts business in Saskatchewan shall pay a tax of 40c for every thousand dollars of money invested in the Province, including money invested in the purchase or acquisition of lands or other real or personal property, money remaining unpaid at the end of the preceding calendar year on any sales of such land, no matter when made, with a minimum tax of \$25.00 when the authorised capital of the company is less than \$50,000, and \$50.00 when the authorised capital is \$50,000 or more, but less than \$100,000, and \$100.00 when the authorised capital of the company is \$100,000 or more, which provision of a minimum tax shall apply to a company during the first year of its incorporation or doing business in the Province as well as thereafter.

Every loan company shall pay a tax of 40c for each \$1,000 of the funds used or employed by the company in investments in Saskatchewan during the preceding year with the minimum tax of \$25.00 when the authorised capital is \$50,000 or more and less than \$100,000, and \$100.00 when the authorised capital is \$100,000 or more, which provision of a minimum tax shall apply to the company during the first year of incorporation and doing business in the Province as well as thereafter.

Every telegraph company and every railway or other company which owns, leases or operates a line or lines or part of a line or lines of telegraph operated in Saskatchewan and does thereon or carries on in connection therewith, a general commercial telegraph business in Saskatchewan shall on account of carrying on such business and in respect thereof pay the following taxes, namely:

1. The sum of \$125.00 for every branch office of the company in any incorporated city.
2. The sum of \$40.00 for every branch office of the company in every incorporated town;
3. The sum of \$20.00 for every branch office of the company in any incorporated village.

Every express company doing or transacting business directly or indirectly within Saskatchewan shall pay the following taxes, namely:

1. The sum of \$250.00 for every head office of the company in any incorporated city and the sum of \$50.00 for every branch office in any city;
2. The sum of \$100.00 for every branch office of the company in any incorporated town;
3. The sum of \$25.00 for every branch office of the company in any incorporated village.

Every trust company which transacts business in the Province of Saskatchewan shall pay a tax of 40c on every thousand dollars of the funds used or employed by the company in investments in the Province of Saskatchewan by the company during the preceding year, including any such investments of moneys invested in the purchase of lands or interests therein and including also all money invested on behalf of or in trust for other corporations, unless such other corporations have paid taxes to the Government upon such investment, and including all unpaid purchase money on land or interest therein which have been sold, as shown by the statement of the affairs of the company: with a minimum tax of \$100.00 where the authorised capital of the company is \$100,000, or less, and \$175.00 when the authorised capital exceeds \$100,000, which provision of a minimum tax shall apply to a company during the first year of its incorporation or doing business in the Province as well as thereafter. The same

tax shall be payable by every trust company in respect of such moneys invested, although the mortgages or other securities therefor may be taken in the name or names of some person or persons or corporation in trust for or on behalf of such trust company; provided, however, that in all cases of moneys belonging to any company or corporation other than a trust company, in respect of such investments shall not be greater than if such investments had been made directly by such first mentioned company or incorporation.

Your Committee have considered all the evidence adduced and as a result of their inquiry, wish to report as follows:

That, in the opinion of this Committee, the Return made by the Returning Officer to the said Writ was the only Return which he could legally make;

That the Returning Officer in making his Return did so in good faith and was not actuated by any motive of bias or partiality.

That no pressure or influence was brought to bear upon the Returning Officer or the Election Clerk, and no Communication of any kind was made to them by the Government or any Member or Official thereof, directly or indirectly, to induce them or either of them to make the said Return.

Having taken certain evidence thereon and given consideration to the matter, your Committee beg to recommend that during the coming year the Government thoroughly inquire into the conditions surrounding the sale of farm machinery and other requisites of the farmer and the collection of payments due thereon with a view to remedying without delay such abuses as may be found to exist, and introducing at the next Session of the Legislature such legislation as may be deemed necessary and advisable. Alex. Beaudreau, Chairman.

Whereas at a Conference held at Ottawa on October 27-29, 1913, at which were present Members of the Governments of each of the nine Provinces of Canada, a Resolution in the terms following was unanimously adopted:

"Whereas under the provisions of *The British North America Act 1867*, and the various amendments thereto, the existing financial arrangements between the Government of the Dominion of Canada and the various Provinces thereof are inadequate to provide a sufficiency of revenue to enable them effectively to provide for their expenditure in consequence of the heavy and steadily increasing amounts required to be expended to maintain the efficiency of the services of their respective Governments as by law provided, and to promote the moral and material progress of the people;

Whereas the financial arrangements made at the time and since Confederation have never been regarded as final by the Provinces;

Whereas in 1867 the Provinces surrendered to Canada their customs and excise duties amounting then to \$11,580,968.25 and received in lieu thereof the sum of \$2,227,942.21;

Whereas in 1913 the total revenue from customs and excise was \$133,212,143.67, of which the Provinces received only \$10,281,042.56;

Be it therefore resolved:

1. That in the opinion of this Conference an additional subsidy equal to ten per cent. of the customs and excise duties collected by Canada from year to year should be granted to the Provinces, payable semi-annually in advance, in addition to all other subsidies to which they are now or may hereafter be entitled, under the reserve of the right of any Province to submit to the Dominion Government a memorandum in writing concerning any claim it may have to larger sums than those mentioned in this Resolution and without prejudice to any existing claims or demands of any Province:

2. That this additional subsidy be paid to each Province as follows:

(a) There shall be set aside out of such additional subsidy an amount sufficient to pay to each Province a sum equal to 50 per cent. of the amount now payable to each Province for Government and Legislature;

(b) The balance of such additional subsidy shall be payable to each Province according to its population as ascertained from time to time by the then last census.

3. That in the case of the Government of Canada concurring in the views of the Conference as expressed in the above Resolution, a measure should be submitted to Parliament at the next Session providing for payment of such increased subsidies and allowances as may be determined upon, pending an amendment of *The British North America Act*, if such amendment should be deemed necessary."

Now, therefore, be it Resolved, That this Legislative Assembly of Saskatchewan doth concur in the terms of the said Interprovincial Conference Resolution, and that a copy thereof be transmitted to the Governor General in Council of Canada and to the Lieutenant Governor in Council of each Province of Canada.

Mr. Speaker then said:

MAY IT PLEASE YOUR HONOUR:

The Legislative Assembly of the Province of Saskatchewan in session assembled approach Your Honour at the close of their labours with sentiments of unfeigned loyalty and humbly beg to present for Your Honour's acceptance a Bill intituled "An Act for granting to his Majesty certain sums of Money for the Public Service of the Fiscal Years ending respectively the thirtieth day of April, 1914, and the thirtieth day of April, 1915," thus placing at the disposal of his Majesty the means by which the Government can be made efficient for the service and welfare of the Province.

The assent of this Bill was announced by the Clerk of the Legislative Assembly in the following words:

"In his Majesty's name His Honour the Lieutenant Governor doth thank the Legislative Assembly, accepts their benevolence and assents to this Bill."

His Honour then delivered the following speech:

MR. SPEAKER AND GENTLEMEN OF THE LEGISLATIVE ASSEMBLY:

Having concluded your duties in connection with the present Session of the Legislative Assembly, I am pleased to relieve you from further attendance, and I do so with every confidence that the work you have accomplished will prove of great benefit to the people of the Province.

The provision you have made for proper and efficient supervision over the capital expenditures of our various local authorities is certain to have a beneficial effect in the direction of establishing confidence in the undertakings of these bodies, thereby enabling them to market more readily their debentures and other securities.

The measures you have passed to enable our agriculturists to secure farm loans on a more satisfactory basis must be regarded as of the greatest importance to the future welfare and development of our chief industry, and it is to be hoped that existing monetary conditions will be improved to such an extent as to enable the bringing into force of this measure at an early date.

I observe that a number of Acts providing for the protection and safety of wage earners and mechanics have had your consideration, and I feel assured that your legislation in this direction will be viewed with approval by all concerned.

The many original and amending Acts which received your attention will without doubt prove of very great value in the general administration of public affairs.

Gentlemen of the Legislative Assembly: I thank you for the liberal provision you have made for the public service.

I now take leave of you, wishing you and all our people my heartfelt greetings for the Christmas season, and the best of wishes and blessings for the new year.

The Hon. Mr. Turgeon then said:

MR. SPEAKER AND GENTLEMEN OF THE LEGISLATIVE ASSEMBLY:

It is His Honour the Lieutenant Governor's will and pleasure that this Legislative Assembly be prorogued until it pleases His Honour to summon the same for the despatch of business, and the Legislative Assembly is accordingly prorogued.
